About the Liturgical Reform in Progress

"O mankind, indeed We have... made you peoples and tribes that you may know one another. Indeed, the most noble of you in the sight of Allah [the Arab word for God] is the most righteous of you. Indeed, Allah is Knowing and Acquainted." (Surah 49, verse 13)

What a joy it was, especially, to see that everything is converging within the Community of the Lady. What was hidden in the treasure chest of the Nations is coming out in full light at the shrine of all peoples.
